

Children's Special Health Care Services

This program supports children under the age of 26, and some adults, with special health care needs, along with their families. Some of the conditions they cover include asthma, blood disorders, cancer, and congenital disabilities. The list of eligible diagnoses includes over 2,700 conditions. Caring for a child with chronic health needs require significant resources. CSHCS works with families to ensure children receive the very best care. CSHCS does not cover behavioral diagnosis such as autism, ADHD, etc.

Families of all income levels are eligible for services, regardless of insurance status. This includes families without health insurance, those on Medicaid, and even families with multiple health insurance plans.

We help with:

- Coordinating services from multiple providers
- Learning about specialty providers, such as Doctors, hospitals and clinics
- Coordinating health insurance benefits
- Covering co-pays or deductibles

• Who qualifies for assistance*?

- Any individual aged 60 or older
- Any vulnerable adult aged 18 or older who are dependent on family/others to assist in meeting daily needs.
- What assistance is available?
 - Safety planning such as changing door locks, eviction, obtaining PPO's, phone and mail changes
 - Financial- Emergency need assistance & referrals, financial account changes, navigating Social Security
 - Personal- Connect to medical care, emotion support, referrals to food and nutrition services, and advocacy

- <u>Why It Matters:</u> Of those who called the SWMBH SUD Access Helpline & received a gambling screening, 73.7% were at risk for severe gambling disorder. Gambling is a silent, often misunderstood behavioral health disorder.

Once we connect with people in need it gives us the opportunity to refer to other services, they may not be aware of to help keep them living independently.




